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

What influence did Emily Davidson have on equality for women?

<u>Key learning</u>

Emily Davison was a significant figure in a group called the suffragettes. Suffragettes wanted women to be allowed to vote at a time when the law said only men could do so. Suffragettes like Emily Davison believed that protest had to be direct – even if that meant breaking the law. Emily Davison was arrested several times and also went on hunger strike in prison, as another form of protest. On 4 June 1913, she ran out in front of the King's horse at a famous horse race called the Epsom Derby and was sadly killed. It took another 15 years before women had the same voting rights as men in Britain.
